PREVENTION OF SPREAD OF COVID-19

The novel coronavirus (SARS-CoV-2) is a new strain of the virus that has not been previously identified in humans. SARS-CoV-2 is the virus that causes coronavirus disease (COVID-19). The Federal Ministry of Health, through the Nigeria Centre for Disease Control (NCDC), has activated a national Emergency Operations Centre at the highest level and is leading the national response. A National Rapid Response Team has been deployed to support affected State Governments with response activities.

- As at 1st of May 2020 there were 18 laboratories in NCDC's molecular laboratory network with the capacity to test for COVID-19 in Nigeria, more are still being added. These laboratories were sufficiently equipped with reagents and supplies for testing.
- On the 27th of April, President Muhammadu Buhari announced that there would be a phased and gradual easing of the lockdown in these locations. He added that, however, the following additional preventive measures would be enforced:
 - Mandatory use of non-medical face mask/covering for all persons while in public spaces. Use of medical latex hand gloves are prohibited
 - Mandatory provision of handwashing facilities/sanitizers and extensive temperature checks in all public spaces. Anyone with temperature above 38 degrees Celsius will not be allowed into public spaces and should be told to return home
 - Mandatory temperature checks in public spaces
 - Prohibition of interstate travel except for essential travels and services
 - o Prohibition of gatherings of more than twenty (20) persons outside of a workplace
 - o Prohibition of gatherings of more than twenty (20) persons at a funeral; all infection prevention and control measures and physical distancing of 2 metres must be adhered to
 - Controlled access to markets and locations of economic activities
 - o Physical distancing of 2 metres between people in workplaces and other public spaces

• HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF

- Members of the University Community should undertake simple measures to prevent the spread of the virus, by following these measures:
 - Wash your hands frequently with soap under running water for at least 20 seconds or use an alcohol-based sanitiser if water is not available
 - O Cover your mouth and nose properly with a tissue paper when sneezing and/or coughing. Dispose of the tissue properly immediately after use. You may also cough into your elbow if a tissue is not available
 - Maintain at least 2 metres (6 feet) distance between yourself and anyone who is coughing or sneezing repeatedly
 - o Maintain at least 2 metres (6 feet) distance with other people when in public places
 - Wear a non-medical face mask/covering when leaving the house
 - Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.
 - Ensure routine cleaning of high-contact areas such as toilets, door handles, telephones, light switches etc.
 - Consciously distance yourself at least two (2) meters to the next person. Stay 6 feet away, especially if the person around is coughing or sneezing.
 - O Do not shake hands or hug any person.
 - Unnecessary visitors should not be allowed
 - An ill person should be asked to stay away from the office

Program Overview

The Department of Sociology, Social Policy and Criminology (SSPC) at the University of Liverpool invites applications for a fully funded Graduate Teaching Fellowship (GTF) commencing October 2025. This opportunity supports outstanding candidates pursuing a full-time PhD within the Department over a period of up to four years.

Eligibility and Research Areas

Applicants should hold a good first degree and/or a Master's in Sociology, Criminology, or a related discipline, including Social Research Methods. The proposed PhD research should align with the Department's broad research themes and clusters, which encompass various sociological and criminological issues. The Department encourages applicants to familiarize themselves with its research environment and current academic activities via its website before applying.

Fellowship Responsibilities

The successful candidate will:

Undertake small-group teaching and assessment marking, primarily on criminology and criminal justice modules, as well as modules linked to their research expertise.

Participate actively in the Department's vibrant and critically engaged research culture.

Receive in-house training and mentoring, so prior teaching experience is not required.

Duration and Funding

Duration: Full-time PhD registration for three years, with an additional one-year unfunded writing-up period.

Funding: The fellowship covers full UK tuition fees (currently £5,006 for full-time UK students) and a maintenance stipend at the UKRI level (£20,780 for 2025-26).

International Applicants: Welcomed but must meet UK visa requirements.

The African Research Universities Alliance (ARUA) PAID Early-Career Research Fellowship Program 2025: Up to 42 Positions with a Monthly Stipend of US\$2,000

The African Research Universities Alliance (ARUA), with support from the Mastercard Foundation and the Carnegie Corporation of New York, is launching this Early-Career Research Fellowship program. The initiative will fund up to forty-two (42) early-career researchers to conduct globally competitive research at the host and affiliated institutions of ARUA's thirteen (13) Centres of Excellence (CoEs). Each fellowship will last six months, between July 2025 and June 2026. A maximum of four fellows will be assigned to each CoE, with all positions filled by December 2025. At least 70% of the fellowships are reserved for female candidates, and applicants must be no older than 35 years at the time of application.

About the Fellowship

The program aims to enhance the capacity of early-career researchers at African universities by providing them with time away from teaching duties at their home institutions to collaborate with highly experienced and distinguished researchers at ARUA Centres of Excellence (CoEs). Each CoE is expected to host research fellows from countries other than its own.

About ARUA

The African Research Universities Alliance (ARUA) is a network of leading universities from different African countries with different historical backgrounds but with a common vision. This vision is to make African researchers and institutions globally competitive while contributing significantly to the generation of knowledge for the socio-economic transformation of the continent.

The network, right from inception, was intended to be different from any other regional university network in Africa. Underlying the approach was the conviction that they could leverage their resources effectively for additional resources from outside. ARUA is currently pursuing this vision through its thirteen (13) CoEs that vary across various science and non-science disciplines.

Background

1. To support the activities of these centres, ARUA is announcing a residential Early Career Research Fellowship that is expected to last for 6 months. During this period, prospective research fellows are expected to stay at the host or affiliated university of the respective CoE and conduct research related to their existing projects. Successful candidates are also expected to explore new lines of research with the approval of the Centre's Director.

ARUA views this Early Career Research Fellowship as critical to consolidating the progress made by the CoEs, which aligns with the main visions of the network as well as the institutions supporting the fellowship. ARUA, therefore, seeks to use this opportunity to enhance the relevance of postgraduate training for early-career researchers.

Roles and Responsibilities of the Research Fellow

The key roles and responsibilities of the research fellow are as follows:

Work with other researchers to undertake various relevant studies at the Centre under the guidance of an assigned mentor.

Write and publish a minimum of one (1) academic paper[1] (a jointly authored paper where the fellow is the first/lead author can be acceptable) in a high-impact journal (at least, indexed in Scopus or Web of Science), with an accompanying policy brief or blog post on the appropriate platforms of the respective host institution.

Deliver at least two (2) presentations and participate in technical workshops with fellow researchers and other stakeholders.

Assist in creating and bolstering new partnerships between the respective Centre of Excellence and other relevant bodies. Assist in disseminating research findings of the Centre

Selection Criteria

The selection of successful candidates will be conducted by the Director of the relevant ARUA Centre of Excellence to which the candidate applies, in consultation with the host institution's Deputy Vice-Chancellor. • Applications should be submitted via the online submission portal (https://arua.org/early-career-research-fellowships-2025/).

ARUA will continue to accept applications for the 42 positions until they are all filled, with a deadline of December 2025. However, candidates who apply before May 15, 2025, will be considered for the first batch of positions. Successful candidates from this batch will be notified by June 1, 2025, and are expected to start their fellowships on July 1, 2025.

Fellowship selection is highly competitive and based, in the first instance, on excellence in the context of the applicant's academic standing, research experience, productivity, and output and, secondly, on the relevance and fit of research experience and proposed focus to the host CoE's research focus and objectives.

Contract and Remuneration

Successful candidates will be contracted by ARUA for 6 months. The research fellowship shall provide a monthly stipend of US\$2,000, modest payment for accommodation, and travel support (return ticket to host institution).

There are no relocation expenses. Additional financial support is available for eligible women who may require adjustment assistance (e.g., for childcare). The host CoE will provide the research fellow with office space.

TEAGASC PHD WALSH SCHOLARS OPPORTUNITY

"'Emulsion-based formulations containing newly-discovered bacteriocin producers as probiotics for treating bovine mastitis.'

Walsh Scholars Ref Number 2025002

Background: Bovine mastitis is a common disease which affects dairy cattle and aside from causing discomfort and malaise in cows, it also results in financial losses for farmers due to costs associated with antibiotic treatment, discarded milk and potential culling after treatment failure. The disease occurs due to infections caused by bacteria such as Staphylococcus aureus, Streptococcus agalactiae, Streptococcus uberis, which results in inflammation of the infected quarter. Although antibiotic treatment has proven to be effective in many cases, recent trends in development of antibiotic resistance and treatment failure means that we must find alternative solutions to treat this disease. Recent field trials that we have conducted using emulsion-based formulations containing live cells of a safe food-grade bacterial strain, Lactococcus lactis DPC3147 have demonstrated varying degrees of cure rates for mastitis. Here, we aim to improve mastitis cure rates by evaluating a recently-discovered food-grade Lactococcus raffinolactis strain in such formulations. This strain produces an antimicrobial raffinocyclicin, with potent activity against S. aureus. Furthermore, we aim to test another lactis strain which produces a separate antimicrobial with enhanced activity against the aforementioned pathogens. This project will contribute to answering scientific questions which may result in using these formulations instead of antibiotics.

Requirements: Applicants should have a 1H or 2H1 BSc degree in an appropriate discipline (Microbiology, Food Science or related disciplines). Although not a strict requirement, candidates with an MSc qualification and/or previous laboratory experience would have a distinct advantage. The successful candidate should be highly motivated with enthusiasm to develop technical skills across a range of disciplines. A minimum level of competency in English is required.

Award: This PhD Walsh Scholarship is a joint research project between Teagasc and University College Cork (UCC). The student will be registered at UCC, where the structured PhD programme is 4 years duration. As part of this structured PhD programme, the student will be required to enrol for a total of 15 credits of courses/modules during the 4 years, which will provide an opportunity for the student to become proficient in scientific writing, communication/presentation skills, biostatistics, amongst other such relevant modules.

The scholarship funding is €31,000 per annum and comprises of University fees of up to a maximum of €6,000 and flat rate stipend of €25,000 is tenable for 4 years.

Projects must demonstrate a compelling business-led motivation, a focus on identifying commercial opportunities and define a clear business-related challenge or evidence of demand for innovation. Projects can be innovative either from a commercial or technical perspective.

Projects could involve, for example, the transfer of a technology or practice from one country to another, the co-development of a new technology or practice, research into a new solution or knowledge-sharing from a research base into commercial organisations.

We seek trainees who have a specific interest in midlife brain aging, its origins in early life, and its implications for mental and physical health in later life. The research training will be grounded in the ongoing longitudinal Dunedin Study, which has followed a population-representative birth cohort for six decades. We collected a first wave of MRI data in 875 Study members when they were 45 years old and are currently collecting a second wave of data as Study members turn 52 years old this year. We expect the second wave of data collection to be ready for analysis by fall semester 2025. This will lead to many opportunities to map individual life histories (e.g., childhood adversity, environmental exposures, history of mental illness) onto changes in midlife brain structure and, furthermore, to map these changes onto a number of health outcomes including risk for Alzheimer's disease and related dementias.

The Women's Voice and Leadership Learning Partnership (Learning Partnership) seeks to accompany the renewed Women's Voice and Leadership (WVL) program, a flagship initiative of Global Affairs Canada (GAC), to provide sustainable resources and programming to women's rights organizations (WROs), groups representing lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex and gender non-conforming (LGBTQI+) communities and their movements. It will complement the renewed WVL geographic projects with peer-to-peer learning and knowledge sharing, capacity-strengthening support to WROs, LGBTQI+ groups and movements and contribute to building the evidence around what works and does not work in terms of funding to support feminist and gender equality movements globally. Voice and Leadership Program

The three-pillar approach

The Learning Partnership centres around three pillars focused on knowledge exchange, evidence gathering and capacity strengthening for feminist monitoring, evaluation, accountability and learning (MEAL):

- Pillar 1 Peer-to-peer learning and knowledge translation to share lessons and evidence emerging from the renewed WVL program implementation;
- Pillar 2 Building and gathering the evidenceto deepen learning, evidence and synthesis of lessons from the renewed WVL partners' efforts to improve human rights and gender equality; and

Pillar 3 - Capacity bridging for partner organizations to bolster feminist MEAL and other organizational needs. IDRC will provide grants to organizations in the Global South to co-design and lead on key activities across all pillars. Activities will be co-designed and aligned with feminist programming principles: transformative, intersectional, locally led and flexible. In the second year, the Learning Partnership will support a series of participatory action research grants. These grants will enable a deeper and sustained evidence-gathering process (two to three years), adopting participatory and feminist data-collection methodologies. An emphasis will indicatively be placed on developing deeper findings and lessons about the impact ("what works") of WROs and LGBTQI+ advocacy and interventions to protect and promote gender equality. These grants will be complemented by thematic, strategic evaluations that demonstrate the effectiveness of different programmatic and funding modalities. The Global Learning Hub will be the key point for consolidating learning from these complementary sources and translating these experiences into applicable, useful knowledge for renewed WVL partners. With an overall aim of improving gender equality, the pillars are designed to generate complementary types and depth of learning, knowledge and evidence, which will answer program learning questions to be co-created with renewed WVL partners and build on those that emerged from the first round of WVL projects. The Learning Partnership is expected to benefit about 2,200 women's rights, feminist and LGBTQI+ organizations under the

The Learning Partnership is expected to benefit about 2,200 women's rights, feminist and LGBTQI+ organizations under the renewed WVL program across regions. They will gain new insights on strategies and practical ways to improve human rights and gender equality, whether in their ongoing advocacy or more specialized topics like utilizing feminist MEAL to support their practices and improve their sustainability. They will also strengthen their capacity for evidence-informed advocacy on human rights more broadly. Ultimately, the goal of this project is to contribute to increased respect for and protection of human rights by all women and girls and the advancement of gender equality in the renewed WVL countries.

Scope of this call

This call for proposals seeks to recruit the host organization (or consortium of organizations) for the Global Learning Hub for a value up to CAD1.2 million. The Global Learning Hub will be responsible for facilitating a global community of practice for peer-to-peer learning and knowledge sharing among WROs, LGBTQI+ groups and their networks. As a first step, the Global

Learning Hub will facilitate a participatory design process to cocreate a learning agenda — shared learning questions and priorities across regions — with renewed WVL partners ("partners").

The Global Learning Hub will then support the partners in coimplementing the learning agenda and have the following elements:

- Learning agenda co-design: Co-create a common set of questions, hypotheses or theories of change, and a workplan for generating, sharing and disseminating lessons learning on what works in partners' efforts to strengthen human rights and gender equality;
- Knowledge dissemination: Administer an online portal for virtual exchanges between partners, and share resources publicly on lessons learned and results; and
- Community of practice: Action learning activities and peer-to-peer exchanges with partners to capture and share lessons in answer to learning agenda questions; track results with qualitative indicators, provide opportunities to reflect and do sensemaking; and help renewed WVL partners exchange and adjust strategies and approaches over the four-year period.

The Global Learning Hub project will work alongside four Regional Learning Hubs to support regional syntheses, contextualized and regionally grounded learning activities, evidence consolidation and lessons sharing related to the cocreated learning agenda and questions, including learning on feminist MEAL. The Global Learning Hub will be invited to play a role in the distribution of responsibilities with the Regional Learning Hubs to ensure no duplication in objectives. Separate calls for proposals are expected to be launched in the fall of 2025.

More details on the objectives and indicative activities for the Global Learning Hub follow.

Objectives and key activities

This funding opportunity seeks to support the creation and implementation of a Global Learning hub to accompany the renewed WVL program. Proposed activities can be designed and shaped with the selected organization in the inception phase of the project. We recognize the importance of conducting preliminary consultations and needs assessments with renewed WVL projects before finalizing a workplan. Nonetheless, proposals for the Global Learning Hub should align at a minimum with three (3) main objectives:

Co-design and implement a Learning Agenda Includes activities such as:

- Co-develop a learning agenda to outline learning objectives and decide on key learning questions of relevance and interest to renewed WVL partners, based on extensive consultations and engagements with them.
- Implement learning activities in multiple forms/formats, including innovative approaches, with a view to enable responsive adjustments during project implementation. Wherever possible, promote capacity bridging based on existing strengths among renewed WVL partners.
- Ensure participatory and inclusive processes across all activities, acknowledging and actively addressing power imbalances and regional, thematic or context specificities.
- Make learning products available throughout the life of the project, rather than solely at the end, and promote spaces to discuss and make meaning on learnings and new knowledge gained from the agenda.
- Offer, as needed, support, guidance, training, etc., to partners on priority needs to guide renewed WVL learning and impacts, including feminist MEAL approaches that can be adapted to different implementing contexts.
- Integrate learnings and lessons coming out of other activities to be supported through the Learning Partnership. This includes evidence from participatory action-research grants as well as thematic and strategic evaluations to come in future years.

Knowledge translation and dissemination Includes activities such as:

- Review and synthesize WVL partners' documentation (reports, stories of impact, briefs) to generate practical insights that can improve their practices and online/offline strategies.
- Create and circulate toolkits, guides and manuals to support renewed WVL partners to be institutionally more resilient and sustainable.
- Experiment with different types of knowledge-translation strategies, such as documentaries, podcasts, storytelling and media outreach. Through different tools and approaches, strengthen capacity of renewed WVL partners to report on outcomes.
- Map and develop strategies to be present and visible at key strategic events, forums and spaces and disseminate feminist knowledge and successes from the renewed WVL program.

Facilitate a community of practice

Includes activities such as:

- Create and facilitate a community of practice for the renewed WVL projects and their networks to enable the projects to share information, learn from each other's experiences and potentially facilitate collaboration between projects as appropriate on priority topics, including a focus on feminist MEAL. Note that the community of practice will not be open to organizations outside of the renewed WVL program.
- Feed and stimulate participation on the digital learning platform, which will be a restricted part of the Learning Partnership (to come). This space will serve as a centralized platform for knowledge management and collaboration across the program. It should not only be seen as a repository for key documentation exchange but aim to stimulate dialogue and exchange.
- Organize online meetings and one global in-person convening to cement relationships and build effective solidarities. The Global Learning Hub will be responsible for organizing the convening (content-wise and associated logistics), and the costs associated with the event (venue rental, food /beverages for lunches and breaks, simultaneous interpretation, IT equipment, etc.).
 Participants from renewed WVL projects across regions are expected to cover their own travel expenses (airfare, perdiem, accommodation costs, visa, etc.).
- Organize online engagements at a minimum every three to four months, ensuring the development of a vibrant, dynamic community of renewed WVL partners.

Track results with qualitative indicators toward a collective vision with desired outcomes and provide opportunities to reflect and do sense-making as a group.

Budget and requirements

The Global Knowledge Hub recipient will receive a maximum of **CAD1.2 million** to cover its activities over the 48-month period. This includes costs associated with the one in-person global convening.

The expected start date will be September 2025, with a planned project closure in September 2029. Project duration is fixed at 4 years/48 months.

Eligibility and desired qualifications

This call is meant for women's rights and feminist organizations, or consortia of organizations, that:

 Are primarily governed, led and directed in the Global South [1]

- Ensure that women and/or gender-diverse people make up a majority of the organization's staff and board or oversight committee;
- Have the promotion of the rights of women, youth, girls and gender-diverse people as their primary mission — and not only as the focus of some programs;
- Can demonstrate that the Learning Agenda would build on existing work and is already integrated in existing feminist movements;
- Can demonstrate sound experience in adult, peer-to-peer learning and facilitation approaches to bring diverse people together to learn, think and act collectively;
- Can demonstrate sound experience leading adaptive, participatory methodologies to strengthen programming and advocacy to advance gender equality and empower women and girls;
- Strong facilitation skills and track record in conducting training and workshops;
- Experience in applying feminist MEAL practices, with an interest in demonstrating benefits of feminist or gender-transformative approaches;
- Have the logistical, financial and institutional capacity to manage a collaborative project of this nature and scale;
- Are able to perform services in English, French and Spanish, at a minimum.

Background and Rationale: In May 2025, the World Health Organization (WHO) published the *Global Research Agenda on Knowledge Translation (GRA-KT)*. This agenda outlines key priorities for improving the translation of research into policy and practice. This call for proposals, issued by the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases (TDR), supports research that addresses one or more of the priority areas identified under the GRA-KT:

- Identifying, developing, and assessing knowledge translation (KT) interventions
- 2. Addressing barriers, facilitators, and opportunities for KT
- 3. Developing new methods, standards, monitoring and evaluation frameworks, and theories

Preference will be given to research aligned with the 2024–2029 TDR Strategy, which supports country-led implementation research aimed at improving access to health interventions, scaling up innovations, and strengthening health systems. TDR's strategy emphasizes inclusivity by working with local implementers, researchers, and social innovators.

The TDR Strategy targets four global health challenges affecting infectious diseases of poverty using a One Health approach:

About the Trust

INT is pleased to announce new awards, made possible by a donation by Trinity College, offering support for mid-career researchers to complete their second monograph, or other substantial piece of research that qualifies for the Research Excellence Framework (REF). This is to be achieved by making grants to Department/Faculty or College, as appropriate, for eligible researchers to cover the cost of a term's relief from teaching and administration.

Ten grants of up to £15,000 each are available in each academic year. The scheme will run for two years in the first instance.

Rationale

In most subjects in the humanities, monographs are an important output for career progression and are weighted substantially in the REF. Trinity College recognises the challenges faced by mid-career scholars who take on major administrative duties in departments and colleges amidst growing care responsibilities and has provided funding specifically to enable the research output of such individuals. Grants are offered to Departments and Faculties in the Schools of Arts and Humanities and of Humanities and Social Sciences, and/or (where relevant) Colleges, to enable mid-career researchers in the humanities to complete a substantial project that qualifies for REF submission, by providing the costs of replacement teaching and administrative duties for one term. Eligibility

Subject: Grants are offered for support of mid-career researchers in the School of Arts and Humanities and School of Humanities and Social Sciences.

Mid-career researchers: are those who (at the point of application) have been more than five years in their current post or nine years since the submission of their PhD for examination (and to include those who may have come to Cambridge after a teaching post elsewhere), whichever is the earlier, and who have not yet attained professorial status (Grade 12) or the equivalent.

The Heritage Management Organization (HERITAGE) is launching a new call for concept notes for small grants (\$5000-\$50000) for organizations, groups, and individuals working with heritage in Africa.

The grants are part of our Heritage Management Project – Africa (HerMaP-Africa) which is funded by the Mellon Foundation's Humanities in Place program. They will fund projects that focus on the protection of and/or promotion of local heritage for socio-economic development in the continent.

"We are looking to untap the potential of heritage in Africa, in order to make a difference for the development of local communities, "said HERITAGE Director, Dr. Evangelos Kyriakidis. "Heritage has the ability to empower and we are ready to partner with local organizations around the continent to this end."

- 2) Capacity development and network building We encourage projects that strengthen local skills and build closer links with peer organizations in the HERITAGE network. Examples include on-the-job training in preventive conservation (e.g clearing or fencing sites), experience and expertise exchanges with other local NGOs on shared issues such as desertification or erosion of sites, co-operative training on museum exhibition design, etc.
- **3)** Concrete and community impact We encourage projects with strong, measurable incomes in terms of heritage protection and benefits to local people. Each project should provide clear indicators of the planned impact. These indicators will depend on the type of work carried out but some examples include increased visitation to a heritage site or program, financial benefits to the local community in terms of increased employment opportunities or local businesses created; tourism earnings; money savings by solar panel installation; the size of area protected from desertification, etc.

- place focus on networking and relationships, new audiences, and opening up civic space;

CALL FOR GRANTS AND APPLICATONS

THE CONSERVATION, FOOD & HEALTH FOUNDATION

Guidelines

The Conservation, Food and Health Foundation seeks to protect the environment, improve food production, and promote public health in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Latin America, and the Middle East.

Types of Support

The Foundation supports projects and applied research that:

- Generate local or regional solutions to problems affecting the quality of the environment and human life;
- Advance local leadership and promote professional development in the conservation, agricultural, and health sciences;
- Develop the capacity of local organizations and coalitions;
 and
- Address challenges in the field.

The Foundation prefers to support projects that address underfunded issues and geographic areas.

The Foundation funds applied research, pilot projects, new initiatives, training, and technical assistance, rather than ongoing support for programs that are already well underway. An important goal for the Foundation is to provide seed money to help promising projects, organizations, and individuals develop the track record they need to attract major foundation funding in the future.

Fields of Interest

The following are examples of the Foundation's areas of interest within the fields of conservation, food, and health, and are not meant to be exclusive.

Conservation

Conservation grants promote environmental conservation through field research, projects, and advocacy that:

- Protect biodiversity and preserve natural resources.
- Help mitigate the adverse effects of climate change.
- Build the scientific and technical capacity of local conservation organizations and promote local, regional, and international partnerships.
- Increase engagement between scientists, local communities and organizations, and decision-makers.
- Partner with indigenous communities and local people.

Food

Grants in the food and agriculture program area focus on targeted demonstration, applied-research, and inquiry-based projects that support on-the-ground science and advocacy. Such efforts build capacity for self-sufficiency and resilience to climate change, enhance food security, strengthen local food systems, and support healthy nutrition through projects that:

- Develop and promote sustainable agricultural practices
- Build the capacity of small-scale farmers.
- Advance farmer research and research partnerships.
- Develop environmentally sound and affordable approaches to control pests and diseases affecting important local food crops.
- Promote indigenous food sovereignty and knowledge systems.
- Address challenges of uptake and scalability through new methods of extension, education, and technology transfer.

Health

The Foundation supports efforts that test new ideas and approaches that promote public health, with a special emphasis on reproductive health and family planning and their integration with other health promotion activities. It favors community-level disease prevention and health promotion projects and efforts that help strengthen regional and country public health systems over disease diagnosis, treatment, and care provided by clinics, hospitals, and humanitarian aid programs.

Activities that help increase capacity include applied research, program development, technical assistance, and training projects that:

- Promote reproductive health and family planning.
- Address issues related to mental and behavioral health.
- Address issues relating to pollution and environmental health.
- Increase the understanding of zoonotic and neglected tropical diseases.
- Address issues relating to nutrition and health.

CALL FOR GRANTS AND APPLICATONS

Key Priorities

In all of its areas of interest, the Foundation gives priority to projects that have the potential to advance the field, build local capacity, promote replication, influence public opinion and policy, affect systems change, and benefit people beyond the immediate project and its local context.

Eligibility

The Foundation supports local, state, and regional organizations in Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, Latin America, and the Middle East in the countries where the projects are based. It also supports organizations located in upper-income countries working with local partners in these areas. It does not support projects in post-Soviet states or Balkan states.

Most types of organizations that can provide evidence of their non-governmental status or charitable purpose are eligible to apply, including non-governmental organizations, nonprofit organizations; civil society organizations; community-based organizations; and colleges, universities, and other academic institutions.

Government agencies and religious organizations may be included as project partners but are not eligible for direct funding.

The Foundation does not typically fund:

- Overhead or indirect project costs
- General operating support
- · Direct food, health or other humanitarian aid
- Eco-tourism
- Buildings and capital improvements
- Projects ultimately intended for private gain. All intellectual property developed with the grant should be public.
- Salaries for Executive Directors of U.S. and Europeanbased organizations.
- Project expenses incurred before the grant is awarded.

Grant-Making Policies and Procedures

There is no minimum or maximum grant size. It is anticipated that most grants will fall in the \$25,000-\$50,000 per year range. Grants are made for a one- or two-year period. Second-year funding is conditional on the provision of a satisfactory progress report, interim financial report, and work plan. Renewal requests for projects that were not originally approved as a multi-year project may be considered, but require a new application.

Grant awards are made twice a year, once in the spring and once in the fall, with applications due several months prior. Timelines are publicized on the website in advance and may differ slightly from year to year.

The Foundation will consider only one proposal from an organization in any calendar year.

Reporting requirements are designed to avoid burdensome work for grantees while providing sufficient information for the Foundation to assess expenditures, accomplishments, and any unanticipated difficulties in performing as proposed. Reporting is expected as follows:

- Final reports are due within one year following the initial application or the beginning of the last year of funding, whichever is later.
- Interim progress reports, interim financial reports and second-year work plans for multi-year grants are due 30 days before the end of the recipient's first grant period.

Global Fund for Women Travel Grants

The Global Fund for Women awards grants to support operational and programmatic costs as well as small grants for organizing and participating in events to enable women's organizations to build strong movements. We believe that this system is the most effective way to create lasting social change because it addresses the root of the problem rather than simply relieving the symptoms. Women's rights organizations that have received a grant from the Global Fund for Women in the past five years can apply between US \$ 5,000 and US \$ 15,000 to attend national, regional and international meetings and events. The purpose of travel grants is to strengthen women's rights movements, influence decisions and mobilize resources.

Eligibility Criteria for Global Fund for Women Travel Grants

Priority is given to women's rights groups that:

- Work with and / or are led by marginalized communities
- Have limited funds
- Focus on one or more of the following thematic areas:
- Economic and political empowerment
- Freedom from violence
- Sexual and reproductive health and rights
- Media and Technology
- Women's Fund

Please note:

- The funds available for these types of grants are extremely limited
- Applicants must have received a grant from the Global Fund for Women in the last five years.
- Candidates must also have an up-to-date organizational profile.
- Forms must be submitted at least 8 weeks prior to the start date of the event.
- At some point, a group may have only one travel grant or grant to host an event that is open or under evaluation.

Boehringer Ingelheim Travel Grants

Travel Grants by Boehringer Ingelheim Fonds: Boehringer Ingelheim Travel Grants are for junior researchers pursuing experimental projects in basic biomedical research. Who Can Apply for a Travel Grant? Non-European citizens who will use the travel grant to work in Europe can apply. Travel Grant Purpose: to learn clearly-defined methods useful for your ongoing research and the work of your research group at home by visiting another laboratory, or by attending research-orientated courses which include practical training; to enable graduates from abroad and their potential PhD supervisors to evaluate the scientific and personal prerequisites before embarking on a PhD thesis. To this end, the graduate student shall pursue a short project in his/her potential PhD supervisor's laboratory for at least 4 weeks. The Travel Grant

Travel grants are awarded for short-term visits of up to 3 months. Boehringer Ingelheimprovides a flat-rate contribution which may cover the expenses for travel, lodging and course fees.

Travel Grant Timing

Applications may be submitted at any time. To allow sufficient time for the selection procedure, applications should reach the Boehringer Ingelheim Fonds at least 6 weeks before the planned date of departure.

Conditions for Travel Grants

Researchers can be awarded one travel grant during a period of 12 months.

How to apply for the Travel Grant

The application should be completed in English and by the applicant personally.

WARC Travel Grants - West African Research Center

WARC Travel Grants: The West African Research Center (WARC) in Dakar offers travel costs up to \$1500 and a stipend of \$1500 to West African scholars and graduate students.

This competition is open only to West African nationals affiliated with institutions of higher education.

Travel grant funds may be used to;

- Attend and present papers at academic conferences relevant to the applicant's field of research
- Visit libraries or archives that contain resources necessary to the applicant's current academic work
- Engage in collaborative work with colleagues at another institution
- Travel to a research site.

A complete application must include the following (one original and two copies of all materials—3 sets total):

- A WARA grant application cover sheet
- A brief (50-80 word) abstract of the activity to be funded, beginning with a clear statement of purpose
- ② A description (6 double-spaced pages maximum) of the applicant's research and how the proposed travel is relevant to this work. This should be presented in a language understandable to non-specialist readers
- A curriculum vitae with research and teaching record when relevant
- If attending a conference, an abstract of the paper to be read and a letter of acceptance to the conference
- If visiting another institution, an invitation from host institution
- If travel is to consult archives or other materials, a description of the collections to be consulted and their significance to the applicant's research
- Por graduate students, a letter of recommendation by the professor overseeing their research
- Proof of citizenship in the form of a photocopy of the applicant's passport.

Travel Support

Students from low and low-middle income countries as per <u>DAC OECD</u> <u>list of countries</u> can apply for travel support when accepted as participants for AfricaLics PhD Academies and Research Conferences; when funds allow.

To apply for funding, the following conditions must be met:

- Your paper must have been accepted and have been informed of a confirmed place in the event.
- Available travel support funding is prioritised for PhD students and early career researchers/ post-doctoral students based at African Universities.
- You must be a national of a low income or low-middle income country. Currently, AfricaLics is unable to provide travel support to anyone who is a national of, or studying in, a country designated as high income.
- If your paper is with a co-author(s), we can only give travel support to one presenting author.
- We do not grant travel support to applicants residing in the country where the conference is located.
- We do not support employees from Ministries and other government agencies (e.g. development banks).

If you are eligible for travel support, you must complete a travel support request form PRIOR to your travel and before the deadline provided for the event. The travel support request form is available here.

Please note that travel support is provided as follows

- Travel support covers return airfares only. These must be the cheapest fare and economy class tickets. We are unable to reimburse visa costs, ground transportation, transit hotel bills or other related travel costs.
- The reimbursement procedure starts <u>AFTER</u> the conference. It is therefore NOT possible to receive cheque, cash or other forms of payment at the conference.
- We cannot refund costs larger than the amount you are granted.
- We cannot refund costs larger than the documented costs, which
 mean that we need original tickets and receipts AFTER the
 conference. You must scan and post back to us after the event your
 original tickets/receipt and boarding passes/stubs. If you do not
 return these, your travel support claim cannot be processed.
- The AfricaLics Secretariat can only provide travel support in terms of reimbursement of travel costs AFTER the conference:

The AfricaLics Secretariat is unable to support prepaid tickets.

History shows that the number of applicants is proportionally larger than our resources for travel support so please try to look for other sources of finance that can fully or partly finance your travel. We receive many applications and since our funds for travel support are limited, applicants should not expect to receive 100% of their funding request.
